The UWA Western Force Cup is a Western Australian public school rugby competition made possible through the generous support of Dr Andrew Forrest AO and Nicola Forrest AO, and run in collaboration with RugbyWA.

Previously known as the Rugby Schools Cup, the UWA Western Force Cup will see 15 schools from across the Perth metropolitan area compete and grow the game of rugby in WA.

Games will be played at the Joondalup Brothers (North), UWA (Central), and Rockingham (South) rugby clubs this year, with different clubs hosting each year.

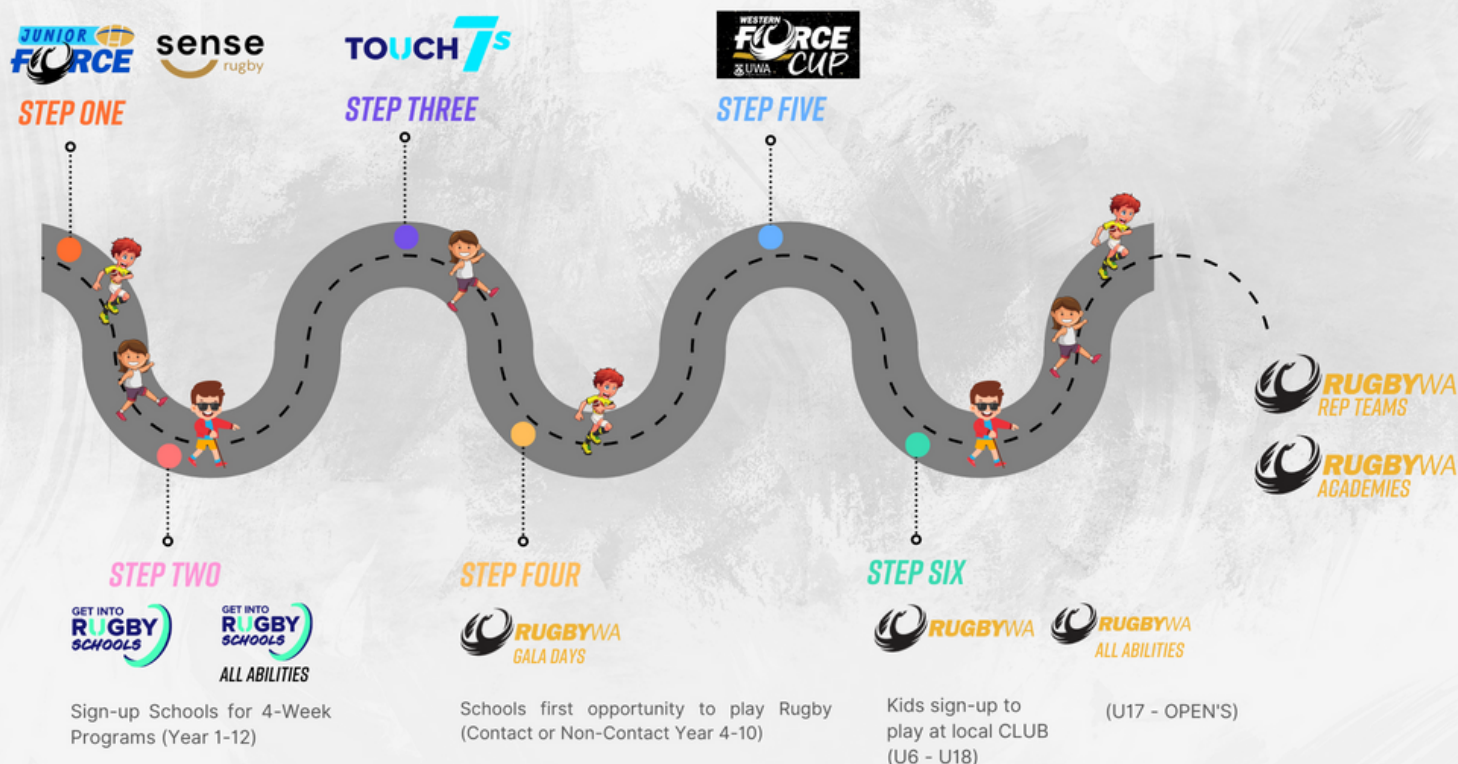

COMPETITION RULES 2023

1. MATCHES

a. Each match shall be played in accordance with the Laws of the Game, Law Rulings and Regulations as published by World Rugby including Sevens & 10's Law Variations, together with all by-laws, directives, and judicial procedures of both Rugby Australia and Rugby WA.

2. PLAYER ELIGIBILITY

a. Players must attend that school to be eligible to play. In the instance that a school is unable to field a team but have players willing to play for another school, permission will only be granted from the Competition Manager when they have received signed parental & school Principal permission.

3. SAFETY

a. If at the commencement of a match a team does not have an experienced front row or the coach determines that the players available are not suitably trained or not of sufficient ability to play in the front row, the opposition and the referee must be notified, and non-contested scrums must take place. If during the game there are insufficient experienced front row players, scrums must become non-contested.

b. All players must comply with the Rugby WA compulsory mouth guard policy.

4. MISCONDUCT

a. All players must abide by the laws of the game.

b. Any player sent from the field (red carded) will be required to serve a mandatory 2 match suspension, unless match officials indicate a more serious offence has occurred which may result in the player attending a Junior Judiciary Hearing.

On considering the referee's send-off report and other evidence, the Judiciary will impose a penalty as they see fit. The Judiciary will utilize the Rugby WA Schedule of Recommended Penalties in deciding penalties. A letter will also be sent to the principal of the offending player's school.

c. Any player suspended from the Rugby WA Junior or Senior competitions will be ineligible to play in the Western Force Cup Competition until the period of suspension has been served.

Conversely, any player suspended from the Western Force Cup Competition will be ineligible to play in any Rugby WA junior or senior sanctioned competitions they otherwise would be eligible for.

d. Referees will use the sin bin for appropriate incidents. In accordance with the laws of the game, any individual who commits a second "yellow card" offence in the same game will be sent from the field of play and hence receive a mandatory 2 match ban.

COMPETITION RULES 2023

Pool Rounds

Time:

- All venues Kick-off at **4pm** and will play till **5pm/5:30pm** (finish time dependent on venue).

Format: - 8 rounds

- **Year 7/8 boys & All Girls - 7's - (7's law link)**
 - 4 rounds (alternate weeks).
 - 7 min halves with 2 min half time. Play will end on central siren.
- **Year 9/10 - 10's – (10's law link)**
 - 4 rounds (alternate weeks).
 - 10 min halves with 2 min half time. Play will end on central siren.

*All teams (starting players) **MUST** be ready and waiting at the side of the field **2 minutes** prior to kick-off of their match. Any delay may result in the non-offending team being award a free kick to start the match. *

Squad Size:

- 15 per Squad in 7's.
- 18 per Squad in 10's

Field Size:

- Full Field.

Yellow/Red Cards:

- Yellow = 2 min on sideline.
- 2 x Yellow = Red
- Red = Out for remainder of the game.
- RWA panel to decide if further sanctioning required. Team/school to be notified prior to next match/round.

*** Sanctions in Western Force Cup will be enforced in club games and vice versa. ***

Scrum:

- Year 7/8 & Girls – **uncontested** unless both schools have the competency and are happy to compete.
 - 3 in a scrum.
 - Inform ref on scrum contest/uncontested
- Year 9/10 - **uncontested** unless both schools have the competency and are happy to compete.
 - 5 in a scrum. (3 front rowers & 2 locks).
 - Inform ref on scrum contest/uncontested.

Please contact RugbyWA Zone Coordinator if you would like to organise a scrum session.

Lineouts:

- ALL - Contested but only lifting on shorts.

COMPETITION RULES 2023

Pool Rounds

Kick-offs and General Kicks in Play:

- As per Rugby 7's/10's Laws.
- NO goal-line dropouts.
- NO 50/22's.

Substitutions:

- Unlimited movements but substitutions can only occur during stops in play.

Squad Size:

- No limits.
- **Each school** must provide an Assistant Referee to run touch during the **pool games**. This can be a player, parent, or staff member.

Scoring:

- Win = 4 points.
- Draw = 2 points.
- Lose = 0 points.
- 4 Try Bonus = 1 point.
- Lose by 7 or less = 1 point.
- No Attendance = Forfeit
 - 5 points to the winner: 28-0 will be recorded in fixtures
- **Top 2 teams** from **each ZONE (North, Central, South)** will go through to GRAND FINAL @ UWA.
 - Positions based on Competition Points.
 - If points are tied, will be sorted by For-and-Against.
 - If For-and-against is equal, will be sorted by number of tries.
 - If tries are equal will be sorted by who won, the corresponding fixture.
 - If fixture was a draw, it will be decided by a coin toss.

- Fixtures will be posted in Rugby Xplorer.

COMPETITION RULES 2023

GRAND FINAL – Wednesday 28th June 2023

Venue: UWA Sports Park – McGillivray Oval

Time:

- Please refer to the Appendix 7: GRAND FINALS DAY schedule.

Format:

- **Pool stage Round Robin, into Semi Final and then Grand Final (7's/10's Laws).**
- **Year 7/8 - 7's**
 - 7 min halves with 2 min half time. **Referees will keep time.**
- **Year 9/10 - 10's**
 - 10 min halves with 2 min half time. **Referees will keep time.**
- **Girls - 7's**
 - 7 min halves with 2 min half time. **Referees will keep time.**

*All teams (starting players) **MUST** be ready and waiting at the side of the field **2 minutes** prior to kick-off of their match. Any delay will result in the non-offending team being award a **free kick to start the match.** *

Field Size:

- Full Field.

Yellow/Red Cards:

- Yellow = 2 min on sideline.
- 2 x Yellow = Red
- Red = Out for remainder of the game.
- RWA panel to decide if further sanctioning required. Team to be notified prior to next match.

* **Sanctions in Western Force Cup will be enforced in club games and vice versa.** *

Scrum:

- **Contested** – teams can only push up to 1.5m.
- Teams that are unable to contest scrums will be sanctioned.
 - **Sanction:** Offending team will be limited to **4 substitutes.**

Lineouts:

- ALL - Contested but only lifting on shorts.

Kick-offs and General Kicks in Play:

- As per Rugby 7's/10's Laws.
- NO goal line dropouts.
- NO 50/22's.

Substitutions:

- Unlimited movements but replacements can only occur during stops in play.
- Teams that are unable to contest scrums will be limited to 4 substitutions **only.**
 - A substituted player cannot come back onto the field.

COMPETITION RULES 2023

GRAND FINAL – Wednesday 28th June 2023

Squad Size:

- 15 per Squad in 7's.
- 18 per Squad in 10's

In addition to the 15 or 18 players Each school must provide an Assistant Referee to run touch during the pool games and semis. This can be a player, parent, or staff member. RugbyWA Staff will AR in Finals

Scoring:

- Win = 4 points.
- Draw = 2 points.
- Lose = 0 points.
- 4 Try Bonus = 1 point.
- Lose by 7 or less = 1 point.
- No Attendance = Forfeit 5 points to winner: 28-0 will be recorded in fixtures

Finals Structure:

Top 4 teams from pool play will play in the semi-finals.

- Positions based on Competition Points
- If points are tied, will be sorted by For-and-Against.
- If For-and-against is equal, will be sorted by number of tries
- If tries are equal will be sorted by who won, the corresponding fixture
- If fixture was a draw, it will be decided by a coin toss
- **Grand Final**
 - 1 period of 5-minute extra time if scores are level at full time.
 - Golden point.
 - If equal, the team with a higher point for-and-against throughout the day will determine the winner
 - Pool games & finals games will be included.

Fixtures:

- Fixtures will be posted in Rugby Xplorer.

Finals Fixtures:

2 x Pools of 3 teams for each category. Teams will be placed randomly for the pools.

- Year 7/8
- Year 9/10

1 x Pool of 5 teams

- Girls 8/9/10

APPENDIX I

MOUTHGUARD POLICY

Appendix 1: Mouthguard Policy

It is now recognised that the wearing of mouthguards in contact sports is an injury prevention measure.

As part of our development program concerning Sport Safe issues, a policy regarding the compulsory wearing of mouthguards in the Rugby Schools Cup.

Players will be required to wear mouthguards when playing in all RSC matches.

To implement this policy, the following criteria and guidelines have been established:

Responsibilities of:

Coaches/Managers/Parents

As a coach, manager and/or parent, it is ultimately your duty to ensure the player/s possess their own mouthguard. Players must fully understand that they will be required to wear mouthguards for the duration of play.

Referees

With the assistance of coaches, before the commencement of games referees will be required to check that players are wearing a mouthguard. The appropriate time is when boots, headgear, shoulder pads, etc, are being examined.

Rugby WA

Will ensure that directives or ultimate decisions given by the referees to players not wearing mouthguards are acted upon.

Procedures:

- 1) Before the commencement of the game, referees and coaches will check to ensure players are wearing their own mouthguards.
- 2) If at any time during the game, it is brought to the attention of the referee that a player is not wearing a mouthguard, play must stop and not recommence until that player has left the field.
- 3) Players must follow the instructions of the referee. Failure to do so will result in the game not commencing or continuing until such time as they do.

Wearing other people's mouthguards is extremely unhygienic and is prohibited.

Implementation:

- 1) Prior to the first game of the season Rugby WA will provide this written Mouthguard Policy to all:
 - 1.1) Schools competing in the Rugby Schools Cup competition so it can be distributed to Principals, Coaches, Managers, Parents and Players.
 - 1.2) Referees who will be refereeing Rugby Schools Cup games in that season.

APPENDIX 2

WORLD RUGBY LAW VARIATIONS

ALL PLAYERS MUST WEAR MOUTHGUARDS

No player shall be exempt from this policy. Those who are undergoing orthodontic treatment should be fitted with an appropriate protective mouthguard. A mouthguard can help protect expensive dental treatment.

WHICH TYPE OF MOUTHGUARD?

Rugby WA strongly recommends that a professionally fitted mouthguard be obtained and worn.

Appendix 3: Code of Conduct

JUNIOR RUGBY UNION CODE OF CONDUCT

Adapted from "Fair Play Codes for Children in Sport" by the National Task Force on Children's Play Canadian Council on Children and Youth.

INTRODUCTION

This code is designed for the following reasons:

- To return the elements of enjoyment and satisfaction to Junior Rugby Union.
- To make adults aware that young people play to satisfy themselves and not necessarily to satisfy adults or members of their own peer group/s.
- To improve the physical fitness of youth by encouraging participation in Rugby Union by making it attractive, safe, and enjoyable for all young people.
- To constantly remind Administrators, Coaches, Referees, Parents that Rugby Union must be administered, taught, and provided, for the good of those young people who wish to play the game. It is their game!

APPENDIX 3

CODE OF CONDUCT

PLAYER'S CODE:

1. Play for the "enjoyment", not just to please your parents or coach.
2. Play by the laws of the game of rugby.
3. Never argue with the referee's decision. Let your captain or coach ask any questions.
4. Control your temper - no "mouthing off".
5. Work equally hard for yourself and your team - your team's performance will benefit and so will your own.
6. Be a good sport. Applaud all good play, whether by your team or by your opponent.
7. Treat all players as you yourself would like to be treated. Do not interfere with, bully, or take unfair advantage of any player.
8. Remember that the goals of the game are to have fun, improve your skills and feel good. Do not be a show-off or always try to get the most points.
9. Co-operate with your coach, team-mates, referee, and opponents, for without them you do not have a game.

SPECTATOR'S CODE

1. Remember that young people play organised sports for their own fun. They are not there to entertain you and they are not miniature Wallabies.
2. Be on your best behaviour. Do not use profane language or harass players, coaches or referees.
3. Applaud good play by your own team and the visiting team.
4. Show respect for your team's opponents. Without them there would be no games.
5. Never ridicule or scold a player for making a mistake during the game.
6. Condemn the use of violence in all forms.
7. Respect the referee's decisions.
8. Encourage players to play according to the laws.
9. SLEDGING: THIS CAN NOT BE ACCEPTED in any way shape or form. Players and Referees are NOT fair game.

Remember Rugby WA have the power to cite Players, Coaches and/or Spectators for behaviour that may bring the game of Rugby into disrepute.

COACH'S CODE

1. You have responsibility for your team and its supporters. EXERCISE IT.
2. Be reasonable in your demands on the young players' time, energy, and enthusiasm. Remember that they have other interests and demands on their time.
3. Teach your players that laws of the game are mutual agreements that no one should evade or break.
4. Ensure that all players get a game. The 'just average' players need and deserve equal time.
5. Remember that young people play for fun and enjoyment and that winning is only part of it. Never ridicule or yell at the players for making mistakes or losing a game.
6. The scheduling and length of practice times and games should take into consideration the maturity level of the players.
7. Develop team respect for the ability of opponents, as well as for the judgement of referees and opposing coaches.
8. Follow the advice of a doctor in determining when an injured player is ready to play again.
9. Remember that young people need a coach they can respect. Be generous with your praise when it is deserved and set a good example.
10. Make a personal commitment to keep yourself informed on sound coaching principles and the principles of growth and development of young people.
11. Encourage young people to develop basic skills and avoid over-specialisation in positional play during their formative years.
12. Create opportunities to teach sportsmanship, just as you would in teaching the basic skills.
13. Ensure that efforts for both skill improvement and good sportsmanship are rewarded by praise.
14. Remember that players are also students so be reasonable in your demands on their energy and enthusiasm.
15. Ensure that skill learning and free play activities have priority over highly structured competitions for very young people.
16. INSIST ON FAIR PLAY, do not tolerate foul play, fighting, or foul language. Be prepared to take off an offending player.
17. Discourage excessive talk on the pitch.
18. INSIST on a disciplined approach by players and mean what you say.
19. Set a good example by personal good behaviour.

APPENDIX 3

CODE OF CONDUCT

MANAGER'S DUTIES

1. Encourage parents to take an active interest in the Team.
2. Encourage Parents and supporters to talk to opposite spectators.
3. Encourage supporters to praise good play by both the teams.
4. Discourage supporters from excessive barracking.
5. Provide administrative assistance to the Coach.
6. Be fully informed of Rugby requirements and matters affecting your team.
7. Look after injured players.
8. Ensure that players are aware of representative trials and if selected, they are fully aware of their commitments and that they know of their selection.
9. Phone results of game to designated person on time.
10. Check eligibility to play for your team.
11. If a member of the team is ordered off by the referee, see that player attends the judicial committee meeting as required and accompany him to the meeting.
12. Registration of players.
13. Make sure player's parents and officials are informed of all functions, social and otherwise.
14. Attend Coaching and other meetings where Coach is unable to attend.
15. Insist on an appropriate standard of team behaviour both on and off the pitch.
16. Set an example in terms of behaviour.

ADMINISTRATOR'S CODE

1. Ensure that equal opportunities for participation in rugby are made available to all irrespective of ability.
2. Do not allow the game to become primarily spectator entertainment.
3. Equipment and facilities must be appropriate to the maturity level of the young players.
4. Rules and length of schedules should take into consideration the age and maturity level of the young players.
5. Remember that play is done for its own sake. Play down the importance of awards.
6. Distribute the code of ethics to spectators, coaches, players, referees, parents, and teachers.
7. Ensure that parents, coaches, spectators, sponsors, doctors, and participants understand their authority and their responsibility for fair play in rugby.
8. Offer clinics to improve the standards of coaching and refereeing with emphasis on good technical skills.
9. Ensure adequate supervision is maintained at all games.
10. Behave in a manner to set an example for all participants.

REFEREE'S CODE

1. Ensure that the 'spirit of the game' for young people is not lost by "over-refereeing" the game.
2. Actions speak louder than words. Ensure that both on and off the field your behaviour is consistent with the principles of good sportsmanship.
3. Compliment both teams on their good play whenever such praise is deserved.
4. Be consistent, objective, and courteous.
5. Condemn the deliberate 'good foul' as being un-sportsman-like, thus retaining respect for fair play.
6. Publicly encourage law changes that will reinforce the principles of participation for fun and enjoyment.
7. Make a personal commitment to keep yourself informed on sound refereeing principles and the principles of growth and development of young people.

APPENDIX 3

CODE OF CONDUCT

PARENT'S CODE

1. Do not force an unwilling youngster to participate in rugby.
2. Remember, young people are involved in rugby for their enjoyment, not yours.
3. Encourage your child always to play by the laws.
4. Teach young people that honest effort is as important as victory so that the result of each game is accepted without undue disappointment.
5. Turn defeat into victory by helping young people work towards skill improvement and good sportsmanship. Never ridicule or yell at your child for making a mistake or losing a game.
6. Remember that young people learn best by example. Applaud good play by your team and by members of the opposing team.
7. Do not publicly question the referee's judgement and never his/her honesty.
8. Support all efforts to remove verbal and physical abuse from junior rugby.
9. Recognise the value and importance of volunteer coaches and referees. They give of their time and resources to provide recreational activities for young people.

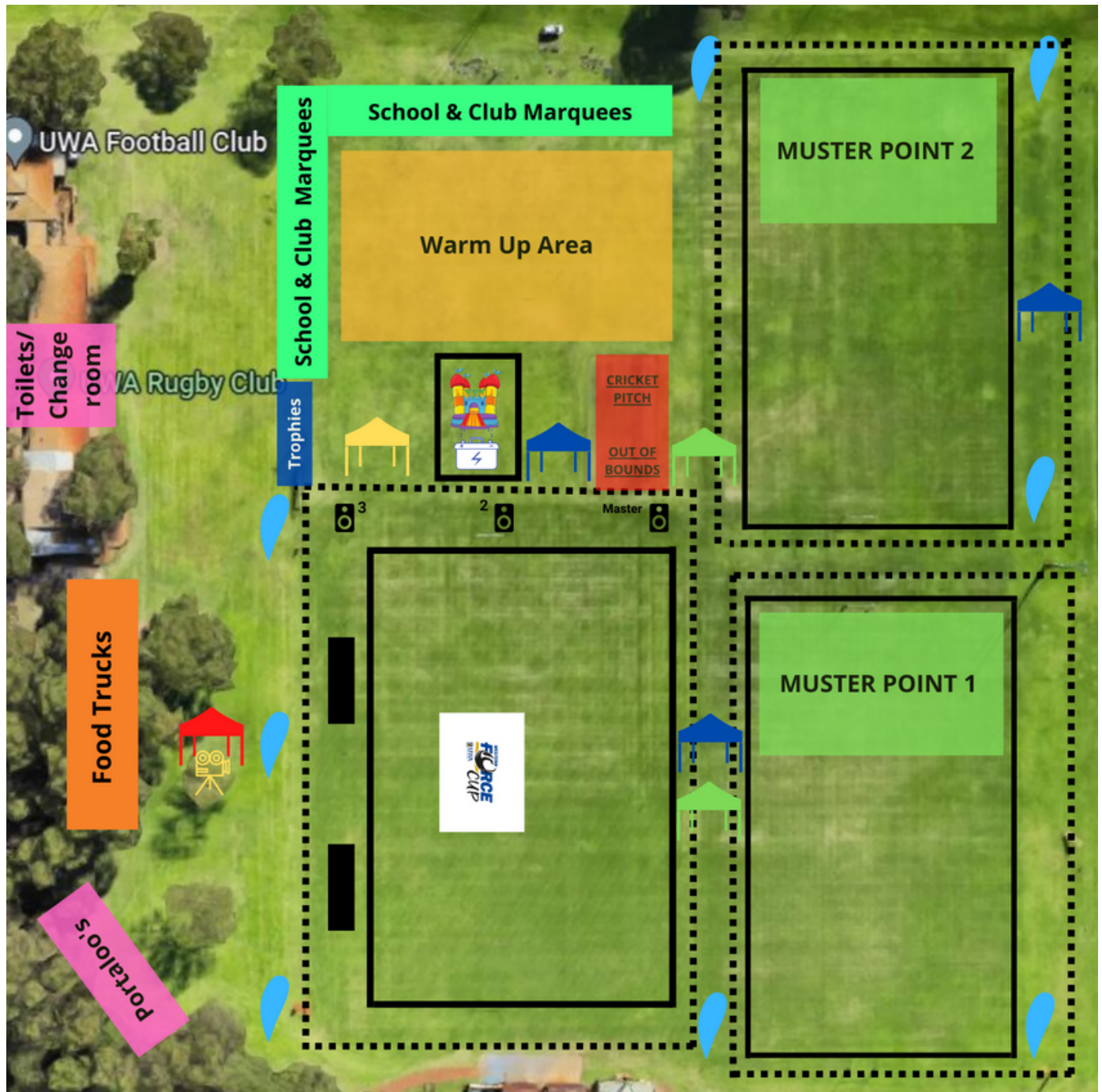

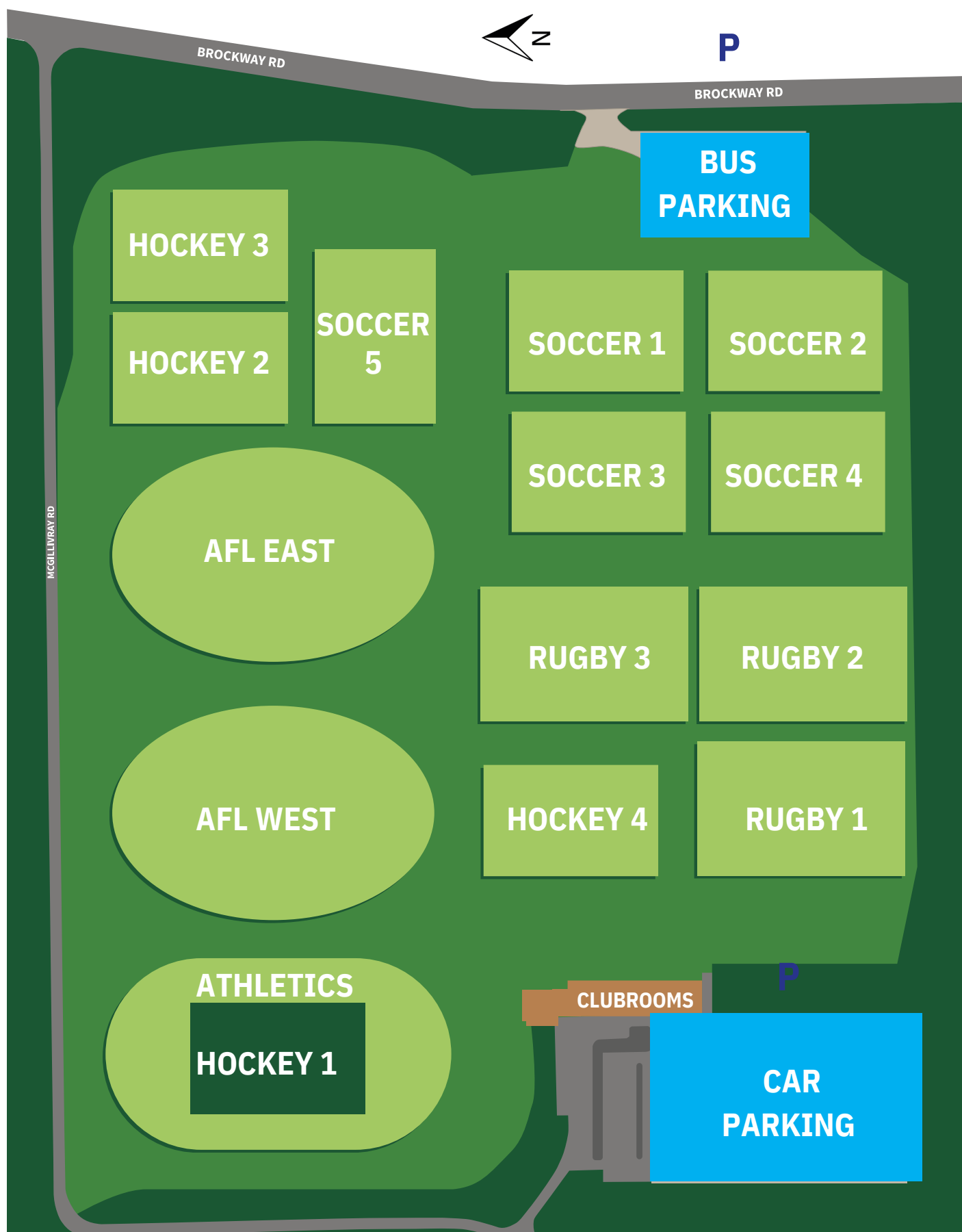
